This was repaired last week, but when the pipe was recommissioned, it blew further along where there was clearly an additional weakness that could not sustain the new pressure. I'm pleased to say that this repair now seems to be good. In doing the work, Thames Water had already identified a further leak up the hill at the top of the School car park and expected therefore to be on the Terrace for another week. Unfortunately, however, the mains at the top of Titchfield Road have now also blown and I suspect therefore that the works will continue for some time. Please be aware of the ongoing restrictions around the School for through traffic and parking and factor this into your School journey.

You may be interested to know that we are hoping to host some activity camps during the Summer holiday. As and when any details emerge, we will post them in the bulletin so you are aware. Year Six Geography – Waterfalls

We have been looking at waterfalls in our Geography topic on rivers – how they are formed, where they feature within the course of a river, and where in the world the more famous waterfalls lie.

Some members of Year Six combined this study of Geography with Art and painted waterfalls – you will a image here:

Here are some interesting trivia (or fun facts) that Year Six unearthed in their study of waterfalls:

- Waterfalls are formed in the Upper Course of rivers the water erodes the soft rock more easily than it erodes the hard rock. After that it is unsupported and collapses!
- Nigeria has some of the longest waterfalls in the world; they are often formed by rivers or streams that flow over ledges or cliffs
- Formation of a waterfall can take thousands or millions of years
- The Iguaza falls constitute the largest waterfall in the world in Argentina!
- The roar from Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe is so loud that it can be heard from 25 miles away
- The tallest waterfall in the world is found in Venezuela, where the water falls all of 979 metres



- Many waterfalls around the world are used to generate hydroelectric power
- Erosion has caused the Niagara Falls to move south by seven miles over the past twelve thousand years, and because of that it could eventually disappear
- Some fish in Hawaii have evolved to climb waterfalls using suction cups on their bodies


This week, the Year 2, 3 and 5 classes have made great progress during their gymnastics lessons, producing some excellent paired routines. Year 5 has explored counterbalance and counter tensions while year 3 has focused on symmetrical balances to great effect.


In Maths, particularly when you go to secondary school, you'll find that Pi becomes a very important number for things you do in Maths, so it's a really good number to learn.

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REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
