Dear Parents,

As the year draws to a close, I want to congratulate your children on their commitment and to recognise how much they have achieved this term. They have pushed themselves; they have grown, and it has been a privilege to watch that unfold. Their work on metacognition has taken shape, and they are thinking more carefully about how they learn and what helps them move forward. Many from the youngest to the oldest have also told me how much they enjoy their new philosophy lessons, and it has been encouraging to see them step into new ideas with curiosity.

The language of the 6Cs is now part of how they speak about their learning. They are naming the skills they use each day, and that shared language is helping them understand themselves more clearly and feel more secure in explaining how they improve.

This final week always gathers everything together, and it was an emotional reminder of why leading this school is such a privilege. The Early Years and Key Stage One Nativities were a masterclass in courage and a delight to watch. Those of you who bore witness to the Carol Service will likely agree that it was something else. Hans Christian Andersen wrote that where words fail, music speaks. Last night proved him right. It was a beautiful expression of who our children are and what this unique community is at its best. It left me without words which, as my colleagues will tell you, does not happen that often. I kept reminding myself that this is a primary school. Those voices last night felt like a glimpse of something bigger. Your children have given so much this term, and they now deserve the break ahead.

I also want to recognise the work of my colleagues. They have carried a demanding term with good will, good humour, and a deep commitment to your children. We have begun the first steps of a five-year strategic plan, and they have met each change with openness and a real desire to get things right. I am grateful for everything they bring to the school each day.

My thanks also go to our governors. They give their time generously, and their guidance has helped us think clearly about the months and years ahead. Their support has been invaluable as we begin shaping the next chapter of the school.

Thank you, too, for everything you give this community, for the interest you take in your children's learning, and for the trust you place in us. It strengthens the partnership at the centre of the school and it is never taken for granted. I also want to extend my thanks to the Handmaids, our family next door, whose encouragement and wisdom continue to guide the school's direction.

This time of year brings a theme shared across many world faiths, that of Light. Light carries hope and the belief that renewal is possible. Across religious traditions, it suggests that things are not fixed, and that living with greater awareness is a choice we make each day.



Christmas sits within that wider wisdom tradition. It suggests that if you want to understand the Divine, you look at a human life in the person of Jesus, a first century teacher who lived among ordinary people, noticed those on the margins, challenged cruelty and dominance, and showed what compassion looks like in practice. The heart of Christmas is the belief that the sacred can be experienced here and now, and that light continues to enter the world through us and the choices we make.

At Saint Christina's, this is our Golden Thread. We want the children to know that what they do and who they are becoming matters, and that the choice to love your neighbour brings light into the world.

As we reach the Christmas holidays, I hope the break gives you time to pause, time with the people who lift you, and time to step out of the rhythm of daily life. However you mark the season and wherever you spend it, I hope it brings rest, connection, and a sense of light in the middle of winter.



We look forward to welcoming the children back on January 6 and continuing the good work we have begun.

Have a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year when it comes.

The Very Merry Results for Bebras 2025!

The children in year 3-6 participated in the Bebras Competition last month. With 85 member countries and more than 2.5 million participating students in 2025, the competition is the largest computer science competition in the world. We have had amazing results this year and a big congratulations go to all the children.



This competition is aimed at raising awareness of Computer Science in a fun and rewarding way. The competition involves solving problems using computational thinking skills.

Computational thinking involves using a set of problem-solving skills and techniques that software engineers use to write programs and apps. Examples of these techniques would include the ability to break down complex tasks into simpler components, algorithm design, pattern recognition, pattern generalisation and abstraction.

Rounding Up Our Sustainability and Eco Focus This Term

Our whole-school focus on sustainability has continued to grow this year, and it has been wonderful to see the children engaging so thoughtfully with ways to care for our planet.

Year 1 have been busy in science lessons learning about the 3Rs as part of our Materials topic. We explored how to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle and talked about why these choices help to protect the environment. The children shared what they already do at school and at home, and we discussed simple steps we can take even further. Ideas included donating clothes, using reusable water bottles, making new soil through composting, reusing bags and recycling materials such as glass, metal, plastic and wood. We also learned what new items can be created from recycled materials. As part of their topic, the children also went on a materials hunt in the environment, identifying and sorting objects based on what they are made from and discussing which materials can be reused or recycled.

Reception have contributed to our eco efforts by planting bulbs in the garden, carefully tucking each one into the soil and chatting about how they will bloom in spring. They have taken great care of our garden area, and we look forward to seeing the planting journey come full circle in a few months' time.


Year 1 and Mondrian Fun!


















Year 2
