
Dear Parents,

The School has felt a little quieter this week with our Year 5 and 6 children away on their residential, but the photos and messages we've received from Osmington Bay tell a very different story! To quote Mrs Ellisdon, "the weather here has felt like the south of France". Happy faces, and children embracing opportunities like trapeze jumps and rock climbing, rafting and cooking around the campfire, they have collectively shown resilience, leadership and real joy in their learning. This is music to my ears. A huge thank you to the team of colleagues who accompanied the children this week, I am very grateful.

Trips like this are more than just a break from routine. They also give children the chance to grow in independence, deepen friendships, and learn in ways that are practical, reflective and collaborative. They remind us that education is not confined to four walls, and that some of the most lasting learning happens when children are challenged, supported and trusted in this way.

This is exactly the kind of experience we aim to embed across our work at Saint Christina's, as part of our five-year strategic vision, Approaching 2030. Built around four key pillars: **Knowledge, Skills, Character Formation, and a Culture of Thinking**, our plan is designed to ensure that children are not only prepared for Senior School but equipped to thrive in a world that is dynamic, interconnected and uncertain.

These ideas are strongly echoed in the collaborative and extensively researched OECD's Future of Education and Skills 2030 project, which outlines how Schools can prepare children not just for the next stage, but for life.



Their Learning Compass 2030 framework highlights the importance of building agency, developing the competencies needed to navigate complexity, and helping young people develop the ability to anticipate, act and reflect. These are not abstract ideals, rather they are practical ways of describing the kind of person we want each child to become.

The OECD Framework prioritises things like critical and creative thinking, emotional intelligence, digital and ethical understanding, and a strong sense of social responsibility. Of course, no study, even one as collaborative as this, is perfect. It was argued that some voices were underrepresented, and it is difficult to measure things like character and values. The framework is also still catching up with the effects of COVID on education and the rapid rise of AI. That said, the bigger picture is hard to ignore or disagree with on a fundamental level: if education is not preparing children to think critically, act responsibly, and shape a better future, then what is it for? This vision strongly reflects our own focus on the 6Cs - Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Curiosity, Creativity, and Commitment. In time I want these to sit explicitly at the heart of our curriculum and our wider school culture. Through every subject and every experience, we want to help children ask better questions, reflect more deeply, and engage with the world more thoughtfully which takes us to the literal translation of the world education - to 'draw out'



A key part of this is our emphasis on metacognition. We are teaching children to think about how they learn, to plan and review their strategies, and to develop self-awareness (ask them if they can perform the Thinking Moves in sign language yet!) It is these essential habits of mind that will support their wellbeing, relationships and decision-making for years to come.

Another strand of Approaching 2030 is our focus on sustainability and environmental leadership, now being led by Ms Randle. This includes supporting children to think systemically, think about their impact on the environment, and become stewards of the world around them. This aligns closely with the OECD's call for schools to embed thinking about global sustainability as part of a broader education for the future, a vision that the OECD itself acknowledges must extend well beyond 2030, into the decades ahead.

Of course, none of this means that knowledge for its own sake is redundant, quite the opposite in fact. But what increasingly matters is how that knowledge is applied and how we teach children to 'pivot'. As the OECD framework makes clear, children must be able to connect ideas across subjects, adapt what they know to new situations, and use their learning to solve real problems. Our job is to equip them not just to know, but to understand and ultimately, to act.

And so back to our little corner of St. John's Wood, and for some of our community this week, Osmington Bay. Whether it is rock climbing, debating a big question, or noticing something new in the world around them, we want our children to feel confident in themselves, secure in their values, and ready for whatever the future brings. That is what Approaching 2030 is all about.


Next, we put on our designer hats and sketched out our own kite designs. We thought about the materials we would need and how we could make our kites both beautiful and functional.

Year 1 Traffic Survey

We discussed our findings and compared them to our predictions. Using colourful charts and graphs, we displayed our data to make it easy to understand and share with others.

Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.



There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them:

- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- **Human Dignity** 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- Solidarity Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, Community and Participation This means all people have the right to participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for all.
- **Dignity of Workers** All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

The principal we will be focussing on this half term is Dignity of the Worker.

The Church has long been a supporter of the right of people to work. Work is more than simply being able to earn money. It is about being able to support oneself, and one's family. It is about finding a role and place within society, finding fulfilment and a sense of purpose and worth. It is also about people being paid a just wage and having adequate facilities to do the work they are tasked with, which is why the Church supports both the Living Wage and Fair-Trade movements.
