Dear Parents,

This week marked the twentieth senior school visit I have made in the past few terms. It has been a genuinely fascinating experience to walk through different schools, meet Heads, speak with children and, truth be told, satisfy my curiosity about how other communities go about their work. It is also vital to build these personal relationships with our feeder schools. I have done a number of these visits with our Head of Future Schools, the wonderful Mrs Ellisdon, and there have been several moments where we have turned to each other, nodded and smiled because something a Head has said has struck a familiar chord. The number of times we have heard metacognition, critical thinking, resilience, or philosophical reasoning mentioned has reached the point where we could probably bring a bingo card with us. It has been instructive and reassuring.

A unanimous pattern has emerged. Senior schools are looking for young people who can think about their own thinking, who can adjust when something has not gone as planned, cope with challenge without falling apart, and who can manage their emotions with some independence. People often label this resilience, but the Heads we have spoken with mean something broader. They are talking about steadiness, that ability to hold your own shape when life becomes unpredictable or uncomfortable and to keep moving forward.

These Heads are also acutely aware of the reality their pupils are growing up in. The stakes are different in the teenage years. These schools know how fast things are moving. Many are taking steps to ban phones in the younger years and limit their usage in the older ones. Interestingly, one-to-one devices are commonplace in all but a couple of the schools we have visited. The tension they are trying to hold together is obvious. Technology opens doors but it can also shut down conversation and connection and overwhelm young people who are still finding their footing. Seeing this up close has confirmed for me that we are right not to have one-to-one devices at Saint Christina's. Even so, navigating this landscape becomes more complex once children move on, and senior schools are having to develop different approaches to keep things manageable.

Of course, the stakes rise again when GCSEs and A levels enter the picture. The schools doing the most thoughtful work are the ones trying to secure strong outcomes without allowing tests to dominate the culture. They want children who know how to think. They want self-determined learners who can take ownership of their work and understand how their minds operate when faced with difficult material.

Alongside all of this, Heads have been very open about the type of families who thrive in their communities. I have said to many of you that choosing a senior school is really about 'fit'. You are choosing a place that suits your child but you are also choosing a place that suits you. Schools are communities, and communities work well when the values match.

The Heads I have spoken with talked very openly about wanting parents who understand the ethos of the school and are willing to trust the professionals guiding their children. They speak about families who can hold steady during the natural ups and downs of school life, because they recognise that growth rarely follows a straight line. They value parents who know that part of becoming an independent learner is allowing children to face challenge without everything being smoothed out on their behalf. It takes a certain confidence to allow that process to unfold, and the schools that do this well are clear about the partnership they expect.



Hearing this repeatedly has been encouraging, because it aligns with what we aim for at Saint Christina's. We want children who can think independently, approach new situations with a degree of courage, and develop the ability to regulate themselves when things feel uncertain. None of this is simple but a prep school must aim to do just that: prep them for the next stage, academically and emotionally, giving them the grounding they need now and building the habits that will support them as the demands increase long after they leave us.

These visits have reminded me that a strong school knows why it exists and what it is trying to achieve. Coming back to Saint Christina's after these visits has confirmed that sense of purpose for me. Looking outward has been helpful, but looking inward has shown me that we are moving in the right direction.

Pastoral Update

Last week, we carried out our Pupil Voice survey focusing on children's wellbeing and safety in school. The responses were overwhelmingly positive, with children sharing that they feel happy, safe, and well supported by the adults around them. Many children also spoke warmly about our pastoral provision, including the Wellbeing Hub, Gardening, Sensory Circuits, Music & Movement and, of course, our muchloved PAT dog. It was wonderful to hear how these opportunities help children feel calmer, more confident and more connected to others. The School Council will now be exploring the children's suggestions in more detail and helping to shape the next steps in our wellbeing work across the school.

Yesterday, the school marked World Children's Day, joining schools around the world in celebrating the anniversary of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Classes spent time exploring what children's rights mean in everyday school life, using a range of UNICEF resources and our new rights posters. Many classes held short discussions and PSHE activities linked to fairness, "wants and needs", and the importance of having a voice. It was a meaningful opportunity to strengthen our whole-school understanding of children's rights.






Metacognition Workshops

This week, we were delighted to welcome Tom Bigglestone back to school to deliver a series of metacognition workshops for Years 1-6. Through fun and challenging thinking activities, Tom linked everyday essential tasks, such as organisation, communication, observation, argumentation, and comprehension, to the Thinking Moves framework using a range of engaging oracy tasks.

Thinking Moves gives children a vocabulary for their thinking, helping them become aware of their own thought processes, and those of others, take greater responsibility for their learning, expand their thinking further, and think more deeply. By choosing the right moves at the right time, the children gain powerful strategies they can use across the curriculum and beyond. The children thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and left feeling inspired and empowered as thinkers.

Primary Mathematics Challenge 2025

Every year the Mathematical Association of Great Britain runs the Primary Mathematics Challenge as a national competition. This year, we had 28 children participate, who were taken from Years 4, 5 and 6.

Children concentrated hard on the 25 questions in the paper, and here are two of the questions asked:

Q1: A desert fox called Oasis walks 1 mile north, then 1 mile east and then 1 mile south. How many miles is he from the start of his walk?

Q21: Matt Brinks has three gold bars, each 6cm x 4cm x 3cm. He melts them down to make one cube. What is the length of the edges of this cube in cm?

Perhaps some of you could solve these questions with your children?

Of the children participating, 5 children were awarded Gold certificates. They are Akari, Altea, Ehwan, Philippe and Sofi. Some of these children may well take part in the National Bonus Round for the Primary Mathematics Challenge next year, but we shall not know exactly who will do so until mid December.

There will be further Mathematics Competitions in the new year, and you will find out more about them closer to the time!

Watching the Seasons Change in Reception

This week, Reception has been exploring the changes that happen as Autumn turns into Winter. In the creative area, the children folded and cut paper to make their own snowflakes, while in the playdough area they explored snowy landscapes with trees, woodland animals like deer, and styrofoam snow.



As part of our weather tracking, we compared November to October and noticed many more cloudy and rainy days. We have also started learning about animals in Winter, especially those that hibernate. It has been a magical week of learning and we are excited to keep exploring as the new season approaches.

Year 4

This week has been full of exciting learning! 





Year 5 Metacognition Workshop: Organising Our Learning & Working Together

Year 6

It has been a big week for Year 6. With more exams taking place, including the ISEB assessments held in school, the children approached everything with impressive calmness and focus.

A particular highlight was a workshop with Tom Bigglestone, where the children deepened their understanding of metacognition. In class, we also carried out a carousel of interview preparation activities in small groups. One task involved ranking values such as Honesty, Ambition, Health, Friendship, Creativity and Knowledge, and justifying their choices. Another required the children to zoom in on an image and discuss thought-provoking questions based on what they observed. A third encouraged them to respond to broad, openended questions to stretch their critical and creative thinking. Throughout, the children used metacognitive "thinking moves" sentence starters to help them expand and articulate their ideas with greater depth.

We also celebrated Maths Week, which brought a fantastic buzz to the classroom. The children worked collaboratively to solve a series of mathematical challenges in order to crack a code and unlock a mystery padlock. Their determination, teamwork and enthusiasm were wonderful to watch.

A busy week but one filled with curiosity, motivation and great learning!
