Dear Parents,

I am sure you will know Stephen Covey's The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. One line in particular in the section on empathetic listening connects directly with one of our 6Cs that we have been focusing on this week: Collaboration. Covey writes, "Most people do not listen with the intent to understand; they listen with the intent to reply."

I had a great conversation with a parent earlier in the week about the polarisation we frequently see in the world. Too often, people defend strongly held positions but rarely take the time to hear or understand those who may see things differently. Any kind of meaningful progress requires a willingness to sit down, listen carefully, and talk openly. These are exactly the habits we are working to cultivate in our children.

When we think of collaboration in schools it is easy to picture children sitting together in groups, dividing up tasks and producing a joint piece of work. These things are collaborative, but I think that real collaboration goes deeper, and it begins with something simple yet challenging: listening.

Without listening, group work is just a collection of voices competing for attention. With listening, children can notice the strength in another's idea, adapt their own thinking, and discover the joy of building something that is genuinely shared.

Listening in this way is both a challenge and an opportunity. It requires children to slow down, to give space to another's ideas, and to resist the instinct to rush to an answer. This is not always easy, especially in a world that prizes speed and certainty and I am not convinced that real growth happens in that space. Perhaps it is in slowing down that genuine growth occurs. A child who listens carefully develops patience, respect for others, and a touch of humility. These qualities are what make true collaboration possible and prepare children for the next stage of their lives.

Listening is also closely tied to resilience. To listen with intention is to accept that your first idea may not be your best, and that you might need to change your mind. That can feel uncomfortable, but it is often in that discomfort that resilience develops. A resilient child is one who can live with uncertainty, try again when things go wrong, and learn from others without feeling diminished themselves.





There is another, less obvious side to collaboration that is just as important, and that is how children relate to themselves. Many children, and most adults if we are honest, struggle at times with an inner voice that says, "I am not good enough" or "I should give up." I was discussing this in one of my Philosophy lessons earlier this week, and almost every hand went up, including mine. That moment was a reminder that this voice is not unusual; it is part of being human. Learning to challenge it is a vital step in building resilience.

When children begin to speak to themselves with kindness, to encourage themselves as they would a friend, they are collaborating with themselves. This inner collaboration builds the confidence to keep learning even when the road is difficult. We talk about our Golden Thread, loving our neighbour as ourselves, and so it is worth asking whether we are truly extending that same love and encouragement inward.

In the end, collaboration is as much about how we relate to ourselves and to others as it is about the task in front of us. At its heart, it prepares children to meet the future with confidence.

Dear Parents,

I hope the new academic year has started well for your children and for you, especially if this is your first term in the Saint Christina's School community. As a newbie in the school myself as Head of Science, I know what it feels like to be the new person, unsure of where the classrooms are, how to get to the playground and to learn all the names of the people we meet in school. Whether you are a new family or an existing one, I am sure that you will have experienced kindness and care throughout the school, just as I have and that you have felt very welcomed.

So it feels like a good time, a few weeks in to term, to use this platform to share my vision for your children and their Science learning. Science in our school is specialist taught from Years 2 - 6. I have the pleasure of teaching Years 2, 3, 5 and 6 and Mr Hirst teaches Year 4 and these lessons take place in our dedicated Science room.

It is my firm belief that a lesson where children achieve well should be a something that happens with children and not to children and where children learn for the moment and to prepare them for their future. Our curriculum is built with the National Curriculum as a basis but it is far richer than only this. We cover the content of the ISEB syllabus for prep schools and we are always happy to capitalise on the interests and questions of the children we teach. Indeed, it is this curiosity that sparks imaginations and those wonderful "what if?" and "why does.....?" questions.


At Saint Christina's we have the capacity to embrace these wonderings and cover all the syllabus demands. We believe in rich and deep learning experiences for the children and Science is a subject where the children can see the real life applications of their learning instantly. Lessons are presented as 'big questions' and children have the opportunity to reflect on their learning during and at the end of the lesson. We place an emphasis on Practical Science so children can experience the thrill of Science firsthand.

Neuroscience is a passion of mine and I hold the work of Dr Andrew Curran close to my heart who teaches that learning is 'holographic'. His research says that not only do children's brains remember events that made them happy, but they remember approximately 20 minutes before and after that moment, essentially a whole lesson at school. His theory is that one happy memory can build connections in our brains that can recall approximately 40 minutes surrounding that moment. Giving children a 'wow!' moment in a lesson with practical science is a super way to build long-lasting Science knowledge for the children in our care.









We encourage children to learn holistically and use the skills they have learned in other subjects within their Science learning, particularly skills in Maths, English and Computing as well as the school's 6Cs. For example, Year 2 are encouraged to use their phonics knowledge within their written work, Year 3 have classified animals' diets using a Venn diagram, Year 5 have looked at the historical significance of the move in understanding between the geo~ and heliocentric models and Year 6 have discussed Science and Philosophy. Children are encouraged to read the scientific periodicals that the school buys and there is a weekly scientific challenge outside the Science Room that all children are welcome to participate in. There is an area that promotes Science and Wellbeing and this week it is about positive self talk and how that encourages our brains to look for positive things, as well as a reminder that if anyone needs help they can approach a trusted adult.

I know from your children that many parents have a career that is rooted in Science and I take this opportunity to invite you to speak to the children about your job. I know that the children would love to hear your story.

If you would like to discuss anything about Science learning with me, please feel free to contact me (schand@saintchristinas.org.uk) and I would be more than happy to hear from you.

I do hope that your children are coming home and talking about their Science lessons and please keep asking your children about their Science learning. All the pedagogical research shows that the best thing to accelerate children's learning is for children to know their parents are interested in what they learn. I promise you that I won't encourage children to use glitter - how does glitter have special powers of survival that defies every cleaning product?! - and please do keep your interest in the Science your children are learning.

Spanish Update - A Busy and Exciting Start to the Year!

- Nursery have been learning basic greetings and are beginning to explore the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' in Spanish. We'll soon be diving into food vocabulary and numbers through fun and interactive activities.
- Reception have been revisiting greetings and have started working with the story Goldilocks and the Three Bears, learning numbers and vocabulary related to the tale.
- Year 1 have been practising greetings and learning the days of the week, building a strong foundation for every day Spanish.
- Year 2 have moved on to more advanced greetings and classroom commands, helping them navigate Spanish in a school setting.
- Year 3 have been learning how to talk about themselves, covering names, age, where they're from, and where they live.
- Year 4 have focused on key verbs such as to be and to have, and have started learning vocabulary related to family members, including brothers and sisters.
- Year 5 have been busy learning how to tell the time in Spanish, including phrases like *en punto*, *y cuarto*, *y media*, and *menos cuarto*.
- Year 6 have explored the importance of learning a second or third language, tackled tricky Spanish sounds and syllables, and will soon begin learning about the weather in the Iberian Peninsula.

It's been a joy teaching all the children and watching their progress. Soon, we'll be celebrating the Mexican tradition of El Día de los Muertos across all year groups, combining Spanish with Art in some very fun and creative projects.

Pastoral Update

It's been a really full week of pastoral activities across Saint Christina's School, and it's been lovely spending time with the children - chatting with them, checking in, and offering support where it's needed. From sensory circuits and music & movement to nature breaks, gardening and the Friday Wellbeing Hub, it's been brilliant seeing so many children using these moments to slow down and reset.

This week we've also been asking the children about belonging as part of our pupil voice work. We wanted to hear directly from them about how happy and safe they feel at school, and whether they feel included, listened to and supported. The response was hugely positive - children overwhelmingly said they feel happy coming to school each day, safe in their environment, proud to be part of their class and school, and confident that adults listen to them and will help when they have a problem. Many also spoke about having friends they can play and work with and knowing who to go to if they feel sad, worried or left out.

It's wonderful to see how strongly the children feel about their place in our community, and we'll keep looking at how we can make each of these areas even stronger so every child feels they truly belong here. The results will now go to the School Council, who will help us turn them into clear, actionable next steps for the whole school.

A highlight of the week was being visited by Misha in Year 5, who wanted to share the beautiful poem he had written about kindness for a competition. It perfectly captures what we strive for at Saint Christina's:



Year 2

In History, Year 2 have been continuing their work on the Great Fire of London. After exploring the events of 1666, they spent time looking at the question of who was to blame for the fire, weighing up the different viewpoints and evidence.

This week, they were set the challenge of redesigning London after the fire. Using images and accounts from the time, including Christopher Wren's plans for rebuilding the city, they considered what had gone wrong before - such as the narrow streets, closely packed wooden houses and thatched roofs - and what could be changed to make London safer. The children sketched out their own new city plans with wider streets, brick and stone buildings, open squares and better access to water, thinking carefully about how these changes could help prevent another disaster.

Year 3

Using the Talk for Writing approach, they are focusing on retelling the legendary story of Romulus and Remus. Through 'talking the text' and engaging in detailed, repeated readings with actions, they have developed a deep understanding of the language and structure used in this type of narrative.

They are writing their versions of the story in stages, using a story map to support them in writing effectively and with accuracy. In their grammar lessons, they are concentrating on using capital letters for proper nouns, creating expanded noun phrases, and including a variety of conjunctions. They are making a conscious effort to apply these skills in their writing, improving and embellishing the original text to produce rich, engaging final versions.




Year 4





Year 5










Year 6

It has been a busy and productive week for Year 6, and I am extremely proud of how the children have taken everything in their stride. They have approached their learning and assessments with cheerfulness, supported one another with kindness, and continued to fulfil their prefect duties diligently. In addition to this, they have represented the school in sporting fixtures, collaborated effectively as a year group, and demonstrated wonderful creativity in their work.

The children have particularly enjoyed participating in Votes for Schools, a weekly current affairs platform that supports critical thinking and discussion on topical issues. This week's key question was: Do you feel proud of living in the UK? After engaging in thoughtful discussion, the children cast their votes and compared their opinions with local and national results, gaining a sense of how their voices fit within the wider conversation.



Our STEM project has also continued, with the children designing a handwashing survey for the rest of the school. The results have given valuable insight into the childrens' knowledge of hand hygiene, and Year 6 have been thinking creatively about how to mark National Handwashing Day in school.

In preparation for the 11+, the children have been working hard on a variety of assessments, including mock comprehension, writing and maths papers, as well as formal tests in verbal reasoning, spelling and reading. In maths lessons, their focus has been on BODMAS, and they have shown impressive progress as they tackled increasingly challenging equations.

In History, Year 6 have been learning about Dunkirk. They have explored the events of 1940, when British and Allied troops were evacuated from the beaches of France during World War II. They reflected on the bravery of the soldiers and the incredible effort of the "little ships" that helped with the rescue, and they discussed whether Dunkirk should be seen as a defeat or a triumph.

Critical Thinking sessions have once again showcased the children's individuality and curiosity. Highlights included a talk on the World Athletics Championships, an exploration of the Bayeux Tapestry and its loan to the British Museum, and a lively persuasive debate on whether children should be allowed to bring their toys into school.

Overall, Year 6 have impressed us with their resilience, commitment, and enthusiasm for learning across all areas of school life.


