Dear Parents,

This morning's assembly was based on the story of a single dot. In the story, the children met a young girl who believed she could not draw. Faced with a blank page, she felt stuck. Her teacher's response was simply to tell her to make a mark and sign it. What began as a small dot became the starting point for something much bigger. When the child came into her next art lesson, she saw that the teacher had placed the dot in a picture frame. Her teacher had noticed the dot and taken it seriously. That decision to begin and to put her name on her work changed everything.

The dot signals potential. Over the next week, every child will start with a single black dot and create something from it. They will develop it, shape it, and sign it, and the resulting "Dotty Gallery" will begin to fill up with very different outcomes from the same starting point.

This links directly to our 6Cs. It takes Curiosity to ask, "What could this become?" It takes Creativity to imagine beyond the more obvious. It takes Commitment to keep going when the first idea is not the strongest. It takes Critical Thinking to refine and improve. When children explain their choices, they are developing Communication. When they share and respond to one another's work, they practise Collaboration.

I'm excited to see the results of this because it reflects how we want children to approach learning more broadly. When faced with a blank page, a difficult question, or a new challenge, the instinct can be to hesitate. We want them to begin anyway, to think, to get started, to refine, and to own the result. If your child talks about a dot this evening or over the coming week, ask them what they might plan to turn it into and why they made those choices. The explanation will show you how they are learning to move from uncertainty to action.

Before I finish, thank you to all parents who attended the Heads' 11+ panel last night. It was a great evening, and what stood out for me was the honesty from the panel and the quality of the questions from those in the hall. The senior heads spoke clearly about wanting real children who can think for themselves, take risks, show resilience, and have the confidence to be who they are. Those qualities are built slowly, through habits formed over time, and they are precisely the habits we are working to develop here.

Which brings us back to the dot. You begin, and you put your name to the work, accepting that it is not finished. For me, those simple acts, starting, thinking, and trying, are where those qualities begin.



Parenting in the Digital Age

Before half term, parents were invited to attend an online workshop, Parenting in the Digital Age, delivered by The Parent Team.

The session built on our recent communication about the school's digital strategy and explored current thinking around children, screens and emerging technology. It focused on how families can set clear and appropriate boundaries at home, how to have open and supportive conversations about children's online activity, and how to encourage healthy habits around switching off and balancing online and offline time.

Some of the practical guidance included agreeing simple family rules around devices, keeping screens out of bedrooms overnight, staying curious rather than critical when children talk about their online world, and prioritising connection before correction when challenges arise.

I'm pleased to share that we now have access to a recording of the session, along with the accompanying PDF handout. If you were unable to attend, or would like to revisit the content, I would really encourage you to take some time to watch it.

Science this week!

We have had a wonderfully busy return to school in Science! This week our Year 6 child learned about the Bunsen burner and had their first go of lighting them. Year 2 have made some beautiful close observational drawings of the inside of a flower bulb and Year 5 had requested lessons on kitchen chemistry and so that is what we are learning about this half term. Children showing curiosity about our world is a beautiful thing to witness and our Science lessons provide a superb platform for children to ask questions, be critical thinkers and develop their learning.

'Curiosity' is the theme of this year's Science Week and we will be celebrating this in the week beginning **16th March**. All our children will have the opportunity to participate in activities relating to Science and STEM during that week, including celebrating the diverse people and careers in science and engineering. There is also a poster competition and here is the information from britishscienceweek.org:

The research behind this year's poster competition

The UK government are thinking about how to build a positive future for children. They are keen to understand children and young people's own ideas on this, so they are asking:

What are children and young people's visions for a good/positive childhood?

The British Science Association and the NUSTEM team at Northumbria University have teamed up with the Government Office for Science to help explore this question.

How will the poster competition entries be used?

Once the competition is closed for entries, all the submitted posters will be considered by a team of judges. We'll also collect some data, like where in the UK the posters are from, the age of the entrants, and the themes that they reflect. This data will be anonymised before being analysed. The team at NUSTEM will also look in detail at some of the posters, to gather further ideas and insights based on the children and young people's entries. They will then be able to look for patterns and trends as they analyse the results."

Celebrating Lunar New Year in Reception

This week, Reception enjoyed learning about Lunar New Year. 



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Year 1 RE: CST Community and Participation

One highlight was the conjunction dice game, where children rolled a dice, landed on a conjunction and had to construct a sentence out loud based on their own story - on the spot! The sentences the children produced showed just how much they have developed their spoken language skills.

The week ended with the children editing their completed stories using a purple pencil, before sharing them with a partner. It was a great opportunity to celebrate how far their writing has come.






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Year 4



This challenge links closely to our school's 6C's, particularly:

YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS ACADEMY

Year 6

This term, Year 6 are embarking on an exciting new venture as they take part in the Young Entrepreneurs Academy, a dynamic, hands-on business programme designed to help them think and act like real entrepreneurs. Working in small groups, the children will explore how businesses operate, develop their own innovative ideas and plans, and build essential skills in creativity, finance and teamwork. Throughout the interactive sessions, they will learn how to pitch with confidence and will work towards earning a UCL-accredited certificate, culminating in the presentation of their own business concepts.

In the Summer Term, this learning will link directly to our £10 Challenge. Each group will receive £10 start-up capital to launch their own small business, with the aim of generating profit for charity. This real-world experience will allow the children to apply everything they have learned, from budgeting and marketing to collaboration and resilience, in a purposeful and meaningful way. The Young Entrepreneurs Academy aims to make entrepreneurship accessible and inspiring, empowering our pupils to be creative, resilient and ready to lead. We are so excited to begin this journey with them.

In English, we have begun exploring Shakespeare's works, with a particular focus this week on *Macbeth*. The children have been highly engaged in unpicking the plot, conducting a character study of the three witches, analysing their famous spell, and even beginning to craft their own imaginative incantations. It has been wonderful to see their creativity and confidence flourish as they step into the world of Shakespeare.

Primary Mathematics Challenge Bonus Round

Each year, the most successful participants in the Primary Mathematics Challenge (which takes place in November) are selected to participate in the Bonus Round. Participants number no more than about 2000 children taken from across the whole country, so anyone who takes part in the Bonus Round is already showing signs of early success in Mathematics!

This year, we had two pupils selected to participate - Ehwan and Philippe, both of whom are in Year 6. They answered questions on a variety of different topics, including paper folding and also the speed of light!

They both scored highly on the paper, and their scores have been entered online; once all of the schools which had children participating in the Bonus Round have entered their scores, boundaries for Gold, Silver and Bronze will be calculated and then awards will be given.

We have high hopes that both boys will gain awards, but we will have to wait until early March to find out what happens!

Two questions that were included on the paper were as follows:

Q7: Rock climber Breaca Legg is in hospital. He eats 100 grapes in five days. On each day he eats six more grapes than on the previous day. How many did he eat on the first day?

Q22: Rial and Dinar have some coins. If Rial gives Dinar 4 coins they would have an equal number of coins. However, if Dinar had given Rial 4 coins, Rial would then have 3 times as many as Dinar. How many coins do they have in total?
