Dear Parents,

I know the sunshine always helps, but this week in School has felt particularly bright and I wanted to register my gratitude for the many ways you, as parents, continue to show up and support our community. Whether you are volunteering at the Primrose Hill Street Fair on Sunday 18th May, giving up your free time to audit our library books in preparation for our Library refurbishment or offering your expertise in marketing, consultancy or advertising, these acts reflect a shared care for the School and a desire to see it thrive.

Saint Christina's is an unapologetically values-led, child-centred school. We are both grounded in tradition and ambitious for the future, and I really believe we are building something special. We want more people to know about the richness of the education we offer here, and how it's shaped by a progressive outlook and a strong moral compass. If you have ideas about how we might widen our reach or tell our story more boldly, please do get in touch. There is wealth of wisdom and commercial expertise on our parent body, and I really want to harness it.

Next week, Mr. Hirst, Mrs. Reilly and I will be spending time reviewing the School timetable and the structure of the school day from September 2025. We want to ensure that our planning aligns with the four pillars of our strategic vision: **Knowledge, Skills, Character Formation and a Culture of Thinking**. As part of that, we've also begun to explore the idea of making certain core skills more visible in our curriculum, which is also under review. These early conversations, still very much at a formative stage, are about what it means to prepare our pupils for the next stage of their education and for the wider world. I do think there is something valuable in naming and teaching skills explicitly, so that children can recognise their own growth and feel ready for whatever comes next.

At the moment, we are looking closely at a set of six core skills which we will likely call the 6Cs. These are:

- Communication the ability to express ideas clearly and respectfully in different contexts
- Collaboration working effectively with others, contributing to group efforts and listening well
- Critical Thinking asking questions, weighing evidence and thinking things through
- Curiosity showing an interest in how and why things work, and wanting to find out more
- Creativity developing new ideas and looking at problems in original or imaginative ways
- Commitment staying focused, working hard, and showing resilience when things get tough

I also want to acknowledge the many thoughtful conversations I've had recently about the use of technology in classrooms. This week, I've met with former colleagues from schools that embraced digital learning wholeheartedly in recent years and who are now seeking more balance. These conversations have been most useful, and we are listening closely to those lessons. As we review our curriculum and approach, we are being careful to ensure that technology enhances rather than dominates learning, and that human connection and critical thought always come first.

There is a real sense of momentum in our work at the moment, and I want to thank the children, my colleagues, and you as parents for the part you each play. We are moving forward together, even as independent schools like ours

continue to navigate a number of external pressures. The path is not always easy, but it is purposeful, and we are not walking it alone.

Your children remain our focus and our inspiration because daily we see them developing into thoughtful, kind and capable young people. Alongside them, we are fortunate to share our space and our mission with the Sisters next door, whose values continue to shape the character of our school in quiet and meaningful ways. That partnership between families, staff, pupils and the Sisters, gives our community a depth that is both rare and precious.

Thank you for being part of it.


Year 2




It's been a great week in Year 2, full of imagination, hard work and a bit of sunshine too!

exciting adjectives, similes to add detail, and a range of punctuation to bring our writing to life. The ideas have been brilliant and the writing








Year 3 Science

Year 3's Science topic this half term is Forces and Magnetism. This week we have been testing and sorting objects using magnets and identifying some magnetic materials. We found out that most materials are non-magnetic.

At first, we thought that all metal objects would be magnetic but then we discovered, through our testing, that not all metals are magnetic. Only objects made of steel are magnetic because they contain another metal called Iron. Iron is the only common magnetic material.



Year 5 Debate Sparks Big Thinking!



It was wonderful to see such mature, respectful discussion and critical thinking in action!














Year 6

Year 6 have had an incredibly exciting week, packed with learning, teamwork and real-world experiences as part of their Leavers' Programme.

To kick things off, they began their St John Ambulance First Aid course. So far, they've learned how to conduct a Primary Survey, how to place someone into the Recovery Position, and gained an awareness of CPR. The sessions have been hands-on, empowering, and a brilliant opportunity for the children to learn skills that could one day save lives.

Meanwhile, the launch of their Business/Legacy Project has been equally thrilling! In their teams, the children have researched recipes and planned what they will bake for their upcoming charity bake sale. This included scaling up quantities, working out ratios, and carefully budgeting using their allocated £10.

With plans in place, we headed to Tesco—shopping lists in hand and maths minds switched on! It was a fantastic experience to see the children navigating the aisles, comparing prices and making thoughtful decisions as a team. With ingredients bought, the baking began.





The children worked brilliantly in their teams, carefully following their chosen recipes to create a delicious array of

baked goods. It was wonderful to see them collaborating so well—reading instructions, weighing ingredients, whisking, mixing, and rolling out cookie dough with great care and enthusiasm. They also took responsibility for monitoring their bakes in the oven and transferring them to cooling racks once they were ready. It was amazing to see the new skills being learned—especially as for many, this was their very first-time baking. The sense of pride, teamwork, and achievement was truly special.

PE Update

We went 1-0 down against Notting Hill Prep but equalised with minutes left of the game resulting in another penalty shootout. This time luck was on our side, and we ended up winning 4-3. Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them:



- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's
 creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for
 sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- Solidarity Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, Community and Participation This means all people have the right to
 participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for
 all.
- Dignity of Workers All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.
