SAINT CHRISTINA'S BULLETIN

Dear Parents,

Bí Cineálta. Gaelic for 'be kind'.

These words can be found everywhere at Saint Raphaela's in Dublin and need no explanation. At Saint Christina's, we speak about our Golden Thread, the same value expressed differently. Jo Reilly and I have been here since Wednesday, spending time at Saint Raphaela's, one of our sister schools, and a shared understanding has been felt throughout our visit. The educational thinking is unmistakably Handmaids. Open, warm, and child-centred.

What you notice within minutes is that relationships sit at the heart of everything. The adults know the children well and work hard to maintain those connections. The trust built as a result then does something important: it allows children to show up as themselves. There wasn't a whiff of performance for the 'visitors from London'; it was all very natural and authentic.

Beyond time spent in the schools themselves, the visit has been shaped by rich conversations with Headteachers, with Sister Mary Corr, Superior of the community and a former Headteacher of Saint Christina's, and with Handmaids and colleagues from Portugal. The children led the tour of the school and they spoke with pride and affection about their community and about what a Handmaids education has given them. As I often say, Saint Christina's is a school you 'feel'. Saint Raphaela's is the same.



There was an openness and honesty in our discussions with colleagues from Dublin and Portugal, and a shared willingness to speak plainly about what matters and what is difficult. We talked about childhood in a digital age and the responsibility schools carry to protect it. Character formation and academic ambition were discussed at length, and there was a shared understanding that they are more effective when they work together. Children who are grounded and secure are better placed to think hard, work hard and aim high.

As we discussed the next decade of education, with all its pressures and uncertainties, what gave me confidence was the same thing that always does, and that is the children themselves. At Saint Christina's and at Saint Raphaela's, they are thoughtful, decent human beings. Bí Cineálta. That feels like a strong place to start.





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The visit has reinforced a sense of being part of something wider, something meaningful, and something grounded firmly in the pedagogy of the heart. Seeing that reflected so clearly beyond London has been a pleasure to witness.

Small Actions, Big Impact – The Power of Words

In this week's assembly, we reflected on how our everyday actions and words can have a powerful impact on others and on our school community.

We talked about how small choices, such as including others, showing good manners, trying our best, and helping those around us, all contribute to making Saint Christina's a kind, happy, and supportive place to learn.

We also explored the importance of choosing our words carefully, both in person and online. The children were introduced to the helpful **THINK** reminder before speaking:

- T – Is it True?
- H – Is it Helpful?
- I – Is it Important?
- N – Is it Necessary?
- K – Is it Kind?



Using this simple guide encourages children to communicate thoughtfully and respectfully, and to consider how their words may affect others.

During our discussions, many children shared thoughtful and mature ideas. In particular, Arlo made an excellent contribution when he reminded us that "the kindness of a smile can create a ripple effect and spread to others." This simple but powerful message captured perfectly how small actions can have a far-reaching impact.

Through talk partner discussions and reflection, the children shared practical ways they can show kindness and encouragement in school each day. We were impressed by the maturity of their responses and their commitment to supporting one another.

We continue to be proud of how our children live out our school values and the 6Cs through their actions and attitudes. By making positive choices each day, even in small ways, they truly make a big difference.

Digital Wellbeing: Talking to Children About Smartphones

Following up on our ongoing commitment to digital wellbeing at Saint Christina's, I wanted to share a website that some families may find helpful when thinking about children and smartphones.

One of the articles on the site focuses on how parents might talk to their child about smartphones. A few of the key suggestions include:

- Acknowledge your child's feelings if they are asking for a phone.
- Be clear and calm about your reasons for waiting, explaining that this is about care and wellbeing rather than punishment.
- Reassure children that different families make different choices.
- Focus on what children gain by waiting, such as time for play, friendships, creativity and confidence away from screens.



The website is run by Smartphone Free Childhood, a UK-based, parent-led movement that encourages families to support one another in delaying smartphones and social media, particularly through the primary years. Many parents find that shared approaches can help reduce pressure and make these conversations easier.

I'm sharing this simply to support families who are navigating these conversations, and to continue the dialogue around digital wellbeing that we already value as a school.

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Spanish Update

This term, children across the school are enjoying a wide range of exciting Spanish lessons, building their language skills through stories, songs, topics, and conversation.

- **Nursery** are learning Spanish numbers through the Eric Carle book 1,2,3... Vamos al Zoo, as well as traditional Spanish nursery rhymes such as Los pollitos, Los elefantes se balanceaban and La granja de mi tío.
- **Reception** are revisiting colours and action words through a very exciting topic called “Los Superhéroes”, using movement and imagination to support learning.
- **Year 1** are focusing on transport vocabulary while recapping shapes in Spanish.
- **Year 2** are learning about winter and cold weather, the clothes we wear to keep warm, and the parts of the body where we wear them.
- **Year 3** continue working on the topic of pets, developing their confidence with descriptive sentences.
- **Year 4** are learning how to talk about illnesses and pains, including how to visit the doctor and explain where it hurts.
- **Year 5** are practising how to tell the time in Spanish, learning vocabulary and structures related to food, likes and dislikes, and developing accuracy with gender and number in sentences.
- **Year 6** are learning about family members, creating their own family trees, and describing people’s physical appearance.

It has been lovely to see how enthusiastic the children are in their Spanish lessons this term. They are learning through songs, stories, games and conversation, and growing in confidence each week as they explore the language and culture.




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Little Engineers at work in Nursery

Our focus story this week was The Three Billy Goats Gruff, which led to lots of bridge building in the creative area. The children were absorbed in testing different materials, sharing ideas and working out how to make their bridges stronger. We focus on teaching children how to manage risk rather than removing it, so it felt like the right moment to introduce the hand saws. Some of our 3 and 4 year olds used a real hand saw with care and focus, learning how to do this safely. It was great to see the problem solving, perseverance and confidence as children adapted their designs and took pride in what they had made.

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Fairytales Fun in Reception

This week, Reception has been exploring the magical world of fairytales while continuing to develop their storytelling skills. Building on last term's story words like once upon a time, one day, finally and the end, the children have now been using new sequencing words such as first, next and after that to create their own stories using our class story maps. We have enjoyed reading a variety of fairytales and talking about different characters, settings and storylines, which have inspired the children's own imaginative tales. In the classroom, the role play area was transformed into a castle where children dressed up in princess dresses, crowns, knight armour and more. In the creative area, they designed and built castles using junk modelling materials, while in small construction they created detailed fairytale scenes and towers. At the easel, children painted their own shields, and in the playdough area, they made sparkling gems to add a magical touch. It has been a wonderfully creative week filled with storytelling, role play and imagination.

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Year 1

Over the last few weeks in Humanities, Year 1 have been learning about Mapping the World, with a focus on locating and naming the seven continents and the five oceans. The children explored the difference between 3D globes and 2D maps, learning that although the Earth is round, maps are flat and can represent the world in different ways.

The children learned that Earth is made up of seven continents and five oceans, the Pacific, Atlantic, Indian, Southern and Arctic Oceans, and practised identifying and naming them using maps and globes. We also talked about where the UK is located, learning that it is part of Europe and that it is surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean, helping children make links to places that are familiar to them.

Throughout this learning, the children showed great curiosity, asking thoughtful questions about why continents look different and how some are connected. They demonstrated strong communication and collaboration as they shared ideas with partners and worked together to locate continents and oceans, as well as critical thinking when comparing maps and globes.







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KS1 Story Club

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Year 3

Year 3 have had a busy and enjoyable week of learning across the curriculum. We particularly enjoyed an enrichment session with Fr Rudolf, where the children explored a series of coloured pictures of animals.

They worked out the colours and animals in Latin, and even had a go at translating simple phrases from Latin into English and from English into Latin.

In Maths, we have been learning how to measure length using millimetres, centimetres and metres, practising choosing the most appropriate unit and measuring instrument for different objects.

In RE, we have been learning about the story of Jesus and the Centurion, focusing on the words spoken by the Centurion and how these are used today in the Eucharistic liturgy of the Mass.

In Geography, the children have been developing their research skills by using information books, atlases and iPads to investigate different European countries, creating informative and interesting fact files.

This week has been a busy and exciting one for us in Year 4! We've started each morning with swimming, and it's been wonderful to see everyone growing more confident in the water. In Geography, we learned about climate zones and compared rainfall and temperature throughout the year. In Maths, we continued our work on fractions, including mixed numbers, improper fractions, and equivalent fractions. In English, we read about insect camouflage, answered questions on Journey to the River Sea, and wrote letters as if we were Maia on her journey to the Amazon. In Art, we explored the colour wheel and mixed paints to create our own versions. Finally, in PSHE, we took part in the Vote for Schools debate on whether social media should be banned for under-16s.

Intermediate Mathematics Challenge 2026

As a school, Saint Christina's first had children participate in the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge in 2017. This is a national competition aimed primarily at children who are in KS4 (i.e. children aged from 13 to 16 years old).

Each year, a group of children in Year Six tries out the paper and realises that although the paper is tough, many of the questions are well within their reach.

Six children tried out this year's Intermediate Mathematics Challenge this week, and their answer sheets have since been scanned and sent to the UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust) as the answers will not yet have been made publicly available.

Examples of questions that were posed this year include:

Q2: What time will it be 2026 minutes after 20:26 on Monday?

Q25: Zoe has an unusual method of choosing when to go swimming. At the beginning of the year she randomly chooses three different days of the week, then always has a swim on those days only. Using this method, what is the probability her schedule will include at least three days in a row without a swim?

Once all the entries to this year's contest have been scanned and sent into the UKMT, it will be three weeks or so before we know how well our children have performed. I shall of course keep you posted on that account.
