Dear Parents,

You'll have to bear with me this week. I came across something in my inbox that I'll admit at first glance did make me roll my eyes just a tiny bit. Four phrases that wouldn't feel out of place on one of those gift shop tote bags with the pictures to match: *Be More Hawk. Be More Tree. Be More Salmon. Be More Wolf.* Here is the thing, as I read on I got quite into the article and started to realise that behind the strapline there was more than a grain of truth. Not just for school leaders, which is who the article was aimed at, but for all of us children, teachers and families alike. Each phrase speaks to the kind of person we hope every child at Saint Christina's will grow to become, and the kind of community we want to build around them on that journey.

In fact, it also links perfectly to a wisdom tradition with a rich history. Taken from classical philosophers like Plato and Aristotle (my view is that most ideas were), Saint Augustine wrote frequently about "being and becoming", a concept that each of us is made in the image of God, worthy and loved, but also growing into the person we are called to be. I am of the view that education at its best holds both truths at once. We want our children to know they are valued as they are, and also to feel inspired to become something more. More curious, more compassionate, more courageous, more fully themselves, and more comfortable in their own skin. Humour me for a few minutes...



Be More Hawk: Seeing the Bigger Picture

The hawk encourages us to lift our eyes, to pause before we act, and notice the wider view. We want our children to develop this sense of perspective, to ask good questions, to be curious, and to see how things connect. As colleagues, we are trying to do the same as we review our offering. We are asking what really matters, and whether our 'why' is leading back to the best possible experience for your children. And for families, this feels like the reminder we all need sometimes in that growing up is not a race, and that helping children find meaning is just as important as helping them succeed, however we choose to define success.

Be More Tree: Rooted in Relationship



A tree grows strong because it has strong foundations. We talk a lot about flourishing at Saint Christina's, and we know that true flourishing only happens in a place where children feel safe, supported, and known. That is why we put so much emphasis on our Golden Thread, and relationships that are real. The Wellbeing Hub is part of this, but so are the day-to-day conversations, the check-ins, and the moments of quiet encouragement. For colleagues and families, it is a reminder that what we build with children emotionally is just as lasting as what we teach them academically.



Be More Salmon: Brave and Purposeful

Salmon swim upstream and take the more difficult route when they know it leads to somewhere important. We see that same bravery in our children when they try something new, when they keep going after a disappointment, or when they speak up for someone else. We strive to model that as a team, too. To make decisions that are rooted in values, even when they are not the easiest ones. For families, it means having the courage to raise children in line with values that may at times run counter to cultural pressures, and a world that appears increasingly to reward shortcuts.

Be More Wolf: Learning Together

Wolves pay attention. They respond to the world around them, and they rely on one another. That feels like such a good image of what a School community should be. We are trying to build something joined up; where teaching, pastoral care, leadership and family life all speak to the same values. The way we use pupil voice across the School is one example of this: inviting children to reflect on their experiences, contribute ideas and take ownership of their learning and their community. For colleagues, we're strengthening our systems for sharing good practice and developing professionally as a team. And for families, this is a reminder that you are part of the pack too. Your voice, your presence, and your partnership matter. Is everything always perfect? No, but great education is always collaborative and willing to learn new lessons.



So yes, the phrases might be a tad trite, but they turned out to be a better reflection than I expected of the journey we are on. A journey not just about academic progress, but about nurturing thoughtful, kind and brave young people who understand themselves and their place in the world, and doing that together, side by side, as a collective: parents, colleagues, Handmaids, and most importantly, the children who are entrusted to our care.




Make and Create




Reception

Year 5 Explore the Ethics of Protest in Philosophy with Mr Walshe

This week, Year 5 enjoyed a thought-provoking Philosophy for Children (P4C) session led by Headteacher Mr Walshe. The big question of the day was: "Is protest always acceptable?" Pupils explored this idea through real-world examples, including historic and recent protests that have involved defacing famous artworks or causing traffic disruption.

Together, the class weighed up the pros and cons of protest, debating when and why people might feel the need to take dramatic action to be heard. They discussed the impact of such actions on society, art, and everyday life, showing impressive reasoning and empathy throughout.

The session sparked meaningful conversations around justice, freedom of expression, and the consequences of protest. Year 5 demonstrated maturity and curiosity as they tackled complex ideas with confidence. A fantastic example of critical thinking in action!

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have been busy taking part in Cycle Training as part of their Leavers' Programme. The children successfully completed both Level 1 and Level 2 of the Bikeability Scheme. Level 1 focused on developing control and confidence while riding in a safe, off-road setting on the School playground. Level 2 took their skills further, preparing them for short journeys such as cycling to School. This training was done in small groups on quiet, local streets to give them real-road experience. The children really enjoyed the experience and showed great enthusiasm throughout!

In addition to their cycling adventures, Year 6 also continued rehearsing for the Wizard of Oz. In history, they are learning about the Maya Civilisation and this week focused on the ruins and what they tell us about city-states. In English lessons this week the children have continued to strengthen comprehension, vocabulary, and grammar skills to ensure that they maintain high levels of attainment to be fully prepared for the start of their secondary journey, while in Maths, the children revised a range of key concepts.


Fr Terry's Food Bank

We look forward to deepening the children's understanding of this principle through discussion, reflection, and action.
