#### Dear Parents,

There's a story attributed to Sir Christopher Wren about three bricklayers working on St Paul's Cathedral. When Wren visited the site, he asked each what they were doing. One said he was laying bricks, another said he was building a wall, and the third said he was building a cathedral.

I think this story has something simple to teach all of us about perspective. The same task can mean very different things depending on how we see it and why we see ourselves doing it in the first place. Plato believed that what separates us from other animals is our ability to reason, that capacity to reflect on why we do what we do. We are 'meaning-making' creatures and it is our purpose, our 'why' that turns a task into something uniquely human. Meaning increases the more we see how our efforts connect to something greater than ourselves.

That same search for meaning sits at the centre of the Handmaids' approach to education. Three weeks ago, one of our new governors joined a conversation with educators from Handmaid schools across the world. The discussion focused on something central to the Handmaids vision called the Pedagogy of the Heart. The General of the Order described the heart as a symbol of the whole child: intellect, character, conscience, and spirit. It is a way of teaching that unites knowledge, compassion, and self-awareness.

Over half term, I happened upon a Handmaids' school just outside of Gandia, Spain and was invited in for a morning to see the school in action. Seeing that same Saint Christina's spirit alive roughly 1200 miles away from us was a reminder that what we do here belongs to something larger. Calm classrooms, thoroughly decent young people, invested colleagues, and a belief that education shapes character as well as intellect all pointed to the same conviction that education, at its best, draws out what is possible in each child.





At Saint Christina's, this idea runs deeply through daily life. Our work as colleagues, parents, and children is joined by a shared purpose to help each child grow in mind and heart. It is the partnership between home and school that gives this work its strength because when children see the adults in their lives working together with shared intentions, they sense stability and trust. That is what gives them boundaries, security, and is also what allows them to flourish.

In these everyday moments, education shows its strength. Children begin to understand that learning takes time. They see that effort matters as much as results, and that steady progress counts. They become more thoughtful in how they speak to others and how they deal with setbacks. Over time, they learn that character grows through simple, daily acts of perseverance and kindness.

This is why I have always believed there is power in the ordinary. Most of what happens in schools is not dramatic or headline-worthy. It is in the ordinary that the real work takes place because the daily rhythm of learning and encouragement has the power to build something lasting. The cathedral in Wren's story was built one brick at a time, and so it is here. Every lesson, every interaction, every act of kindness adds to something larger than ourselves: a community grounded in purpose and something none of us could create alone.

#### Healthy Eating Workshops with Ellie - Holroyd Howe Nutritionist

This week we were delighted to welcome back Ellie, our nutritionist from Holroyd Howe, who spoke to all classes from Year 1 to Year 6 about the importance of healthy eating.

Ellie helped the children understand how different foods help our bodies in different ways, using the idea of "Grow, Glow and Go" foods:

- Grow foods (like meat, fish, eggs, beans and dairy) help us build strong muscles and bones.
- Glow foods (like fruit and vegetables) keep our skin, hair and immune system healthy.
- Go foods (like bread, rice and pasta) give us the energy we need to learn and play.

The sessions were engaging and interactive, with lots of excellent questions from the children. A big thank you to Ellie for another inspiring visit!

#### Art Workshops Inspired by Alma Thomas and Faith Ringgold

Our Year 2 and Year 6 children had a wonderful time taking part in inspiring art workshops led by London-based artist Nicola Bellifantie, who uses recycled materials to create artwork with both children and adults.

During the Year 2 workshop, the children learned about Alma Thomas, a pioneering African American artist and educator who became the first Black woman to have a solo exhibition at the Whitney Museum of American Art. They explored her colourful, mosaic-like style and discussed her important contributions as a female Black artist in America. The workshop concluded with the children creating their own bright bunting inspired by Alma Thomas's joyful use of colour and pattern.

Following on from the Year 2 session, Year 6 linked their workshop to the work of Faith Ringgold, an artist and author known for her storytelling through art. Using cut-outs from the English newspaper The Voice, the children framed groundbreaking Black figures and created bunting pieces celebrating their stories. Once they completed this part of the activity, the children then designed their own life story bunting, using self-portraits, hobbies, and beautiful memories to express who they are. The results were lovely, personal, and full of creativity. It has been a nice reflection of the children's individuality and artistic expression.

#### **Bonfire Night Celebrations in Nursery**

#### Thinking Moves in Reception: Our Journey So Far

Last half term, Reception began their exciting journey into Thinking Moves, a metacognition programme that helps children learn to think deeply, explain their ideas clearly, and listen thoughtfully to others. We are excited to be continuing this learning throughout the Autumn term.

Our focus words last term were "Explain" and "Look and Listen." The children have learned that explaining means sharing what they are thinking and giving reasons for their ideas, and that looking and listening carefully helps us understand and respect what others have to say.

Each week, we explore a new sticky question in philosophy that encourages the children to think, reflect, and share. First, the question is introduced and discussed as a class. The children then talk about their ideas with a thinking partner, listening and responding to each other's thoughts. After that, children have the opportunity to come to the front of the class, wear the sparkly green Thinking Hat, and explain their ideas to the group. This is a special moment that many children look forward to, and it helps build their confidence in speaking and reasoning.

So far, the children have explored questions such as:

- "What is the friendliest colour?"
- Some children said yellow because it feels bright and happy, while others thought blue was calm and peaceful. This helped introduce the idea of explaining a choice and listening respectfully to others.
- "Would you rather be super strong or super stretchy?"
- Linking to our superhero topic, the children gave thoughtful reasons for their choices, such as helping friends or reaching faraway things.
- "If you could do any magic, what would you do?"
- Inspired by potion-making and Halloween fun, the children shared imaginative answers and explained how their magic could help others or make the world more fun.

Each week, the sticky question is sent home on the children's shirts so that families can continue these thoughtful conversations together.

We are so proud of how confidently and thoughtfully the children are now sharing their ideas, and we look forward to seeing their thinking continue to grow this term.






#### Year 1 Exploring "El Día de los Muertos"
















#### Year 2


This week, Year 2 have had a wonderfully creative and reflective time. The children took part in an inspiring art workshop, where they learned how to design and make their own bunting using patterns, colours, and shapes. They also spent time preparing for their Mass, practising their readings and hymns with great care and respect. In Maths, the class focused on adding and subtracting two-digit numbers and addition across a ten, using practical strategies to strengthen their understanding. In English, they explored metaphors, personification and rhyming, discovering how writers use language to bring their ideas to life. In History, the children learned about Remembrance, showing empathy and maturity as they reflected on its meaning and importance. During PSHE, we focused on Anti-Bullying Week, thinking carefully about the importance of kindness and friendship, and how we can make sure everyone feels included and valued. It has been a busy, creative, and thoughtful week for Year 2!

#### Year 3

Year 3 have been learning about the features and layout of explanation texts in their literacy lessons this week. In Maths, they have been focusing on addition and subtraction and finding estimates and using the inverse operations to check whether calculations are correct. In History, they have been exploring the enquiry question 'Did the native Britons welcome or resist the Romans and why?' and finding out all about Boudicca and her revolt against the Romans. In their DT lesson, they began making Roman shields.

#### Year 4

This week in Religion, we explored the Catholic Social Teaching principle of Preferential Option for the Poor, learning about the inspiring work of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society and creating flyers and articles to support donations to SVP and Father Terry's Food Bank. We also began our new topic, Prophecy and Promise, with the story of Elijah the Prophet. In History, we delved into Ancient Egyptian mythology, identifying gods like Ra, Anubis, and Osiris, and crafting detailed fact files. Maths saw us tackling factor pairs and mastering multiplication and division by 10 and 100. In English, we sharpened our skills with direct speech and main ideas, continued reading Secrets of a Sun King, and wrote imaginative entries for the Give Nature a Voice competition, inspired by a powerful Year 4 clip of a polar bear. A special visit from Ellie the Nutritionist helped us understand the importance of healthy eating, and we wrapped up the week with a spirited Interhouse Football competition alongside Year 3 - well done to all who played with pride, and congratulations to the winning house!

#### Key Stage Two Prayer and Liturgy Assembly: All Saints and All Souls

This week, Key Stage Two came together for a special assembly to celebrate and learn about the Feast of All Saints (1st November) and the Feast of All Souls (2nd November). The children reflected on how these special days remind us to honour all the saints and to pray for those who have died.

Through an engaging video and a fun quiz, pupils learned about saints such as Saint Pio, Saint Martin de Porres, Saint Clare, and Saint Francis Xavier. They discovered how each of these saints followed Jesus' example through their kindness, faith, and service to others, showing us ways we can try to live like Jesus every day. It was a reflective and uplifting celebration for everyone.

#### **Year 5 Trip**

On Thursday, Year 5 took a fascinating trip back to 1893 with a visit to the Ragged School Museum in East London, originally set up by Dr Barnardo. The children stepped into the shoes of Victorian pupils and quickly discovered that school life back then was very different!

Good posture was essential, children were expected to be silent, and lessons focused on rote learning, handwriting, and plenty of arithmetic, including the tricky Victorian money system. Pupils also learned about some of the strict punishments used in classrooms, such as the back straightener for slouching, the dunce's hat for anyone falling behind, and finger traps for fidgeting!

The day continued with a hands-on workshop about Victorian home life, where the children learned how clothes were washed using a large tub, washing dolly, and mangle. They even tried smelling the strong carbolic soap (with mixed reactions!) and were amazed to discover that all buttons had to be removed before drying clothes through the mangle, only to be sewn back on again afterward.

It was a wonderful experience that brought history to life and helped Year 5 truly appreciate how much school and home life have changed since Victorian times.

#### Year 6

Year 6 have settled back into the rhythm of revision and mock exams this week. With exam season now underway and continuing for some children into January, the children have been completing both online and written assessments in line with the format of their upcoming tests.

On Tuesday, we welcomed Ellie from Holroyd Howe, who spoke to the class about maintaining a healthy, balanced diet and the importance of staying hydrated, particularly during busy and sometimes stressful exam periods. This was a timely reminder to fuel both body and mind.

Our History lessons have continued to explore World War II, and this week we focused on the impact of the Blitz, considering both its historical significance and the experiences of those who lived through it.

The children enjoyed an engaging enrichment session with Father Rudolf, who linked our 6Cs, particularly collaboration, to some challenging and thought-provoking maths probability puzzles.

A highlight of the week was the art workshop led by artist Nicola where the children explored the use of recycled materials and reflected on the work of Faith Ringgold and her "framed stories".
