We have been enjoying a really great week in School. So much has been going on, and I've been delighted with how well the children have risen to the challenges.

Today, as well as being Red Nose Day, we are having our Virtual Reality Workshops, as part of Science Week, enabling the children to explore a few aspects of this tech and find out a bit more about what it can do for us. Yesterday was Pi Day, and it was a real pleasure to see how well the children have applied themselves to trying to memorise it in assembly this morning. Congratulations to all the big hitters this year – Gina, Allegra, Claudia, Kao, Giulio, Philippe and Noah all memorised Pi between 80 and 105 decimal places. In addition to this, a tag team of Year 6 girls delivered Pi to 331 with Kao reciting 131 numbers, making her the champion Pi Master for this year's competition. A special mention, however, goes to Arthur in our Reception Class who stood in front of the whole school and recited Pi to an awesome 17 decimal places. We also got the chance to listen to our quirkiest entry into the Pi Competition too! Sebastian decided he would learn Pi to 30 decimal places... and deliver it in 5 seconds! And he did! A really big thank you and massive well done to everyone who has taken part in the competition again. The discipline and creativity around the different strategies for learning something as incongruous as Pi, is eye-opening and will only add to the strength of our children as learners throughout their lives. We will be putting a few of our recitations on to Instagram, so do please have a look and maybe share them a like!

On Tuesday, we held our Spring Open Morning. I would like to thank Sr. Noella and a number of our parents for coming and supporting the event. We are very grateful to you all for the time that you have given, and for helping make the event so positive. The feedback that we have had from some of the attendees has been really encouraging, so I am very happy with everything. As a School, we do not have a big marketing operation, so we are grateful to all of you who mention us to your friends and colleagues.

Next week is the last week of clubs, which means that we are heading into the end of term already – I know! We are looking forward to the Passion Play from the Year 6 class, and we still have a number of exciting events to look forward to including many sporting events.

Your road update for the week is that the work is likely to be finished next week. ## Saint Christina's Pi Day Challenge: Unveiling Mathematical Brilliance! $\pi$

In celebration of Pi Day, Saint Christina's pupils showcased their exceptional memory prowess in a thrilling challenge. From the youngest of minds to the seasoned veterans in Year 6, the enthusiasm for Pi Day and its mathematical feats was palpable.

Arthur in our Reception Class, stunned everyone by flawlessly recalling 17 digits of Pi, becoming the new Pi record holder in Reception. Luna followed at 6 digits, who was then followed by Arya and Juliet at 5. In Year 3, Amelia was named the Pi class record holder as she recited 35 decimal places.

Multiple pupils astounded with their ability to memorise approximately 100 digits each, demonstrating an impressive grasp of this irrational number.

However, it was Kao in Year 6 who managed to steal the spotlight, by recalling an outstanding 131 to the decimal. The children's dedication and determination truly exemplified the spirit of Pi Day.

Yet, amidst these impressive displays, one challenger emerged as a true expert. With unmatched speed and precision, Seb effortlessly recited 30 digits of Pi in a mere 5 seconds, showcasing not only memory prowess but also remarkable adaptability and initiative to the challenge.

Saint Christina's Pi Day Challenge was not just a test of memory but a celebration of mathematical curiosity and ingenuity. These young minds have not only memorised Pi but have also ignited a spark for the infinite wonders that arise with mathematics.

## Science Week

This year's theme celebrates the passing of **TIME** since British Science Week began 30 years ago, as well as looking at what the future may hold for us and our planet. Year 5 became time travelling programmers and enjoyed creating and coding their own time-travel games and animations. Years 3 and 4 explored the concept of time by researching about the life spans of different animals; for example, the Greenland shark is the world's longest living vertebrate and can live for 400 years! Other activities included: investigating the relationship between the length of a pendulum and the period of time for its swing; studying the relationship between the orbital time of planets and their distance to the sun; and timing how quickly they could do a task such as recite the alphabet backwards!

We also had a visit this week from our sustainability expert, Anna, from our caterers, Holroyd Howe. Anna taught us all about living sustainably and reminded us what materials we can recycle – more than most children thought of – for example, even light bulbs can be recycled if they are taken to larger recycling centres.

The final part of Science Week has been our virtual reality day, Early Years and Year 1 travelled to the small world of mini-beasts and got up close and personal with ladybirds, slugs, and spiders! The older years travelled inside the human body to study the digestive system, blood, and skeletal systems.

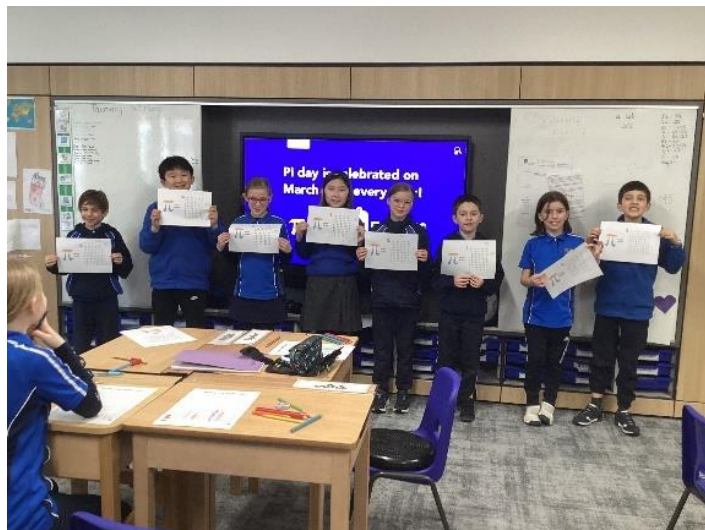


## Year 4 celebrate Pi Day

She talked to us about producers and consumers in the food chain, and we looked at various different food chains. Anna then explained that the challenges facing the food chains are:

- Changing temperatures can cause the amount of a certain animal in a food web to increase or decrease.
- The distribution of species in a food web could change with rising temperatures.
- Loss of habitats can remove key animals from a food web - either from humans or climate change.

## PSHE in Year Six

On Monday morning, Alex Perry came to speak to us about the safe usage of London Transport and its services. He kept an upbeat tone throughout and interspersed films with stories and question and answer sessions. This kept all of Year Six on their toes and thinking carefully about the best way to use tubes and buses (and by default, trams and other modes of transport). They learnt a lot from the talk, and here are some of their main findings and views:

- I learnt that it was important to step back by your body and one step back when waiting for a bus and tube
- We should never go across the gap in the train because there is a risk of falling!
- If it is late at night on the tube, always go into the middle carriage as there are more people there
- I learnt more about 'safer stranger' as it is someone who has a particular uniform on
- Now I feel safer about where to stand when travelling
- The talk was relevant because it was about safety and how to treat other people on the trains

There were a few utterly astonished faces when they realised that the value of a Zip card was well in advance of £3000, since that represented the amount of money that could be saved by using their Zip cards while at secondary school!

## Mathematics at Saint Christina's

Mathematics has had a great boost this week at Saint Christina's – not only did we experience Pi day, but we also had some very informative talks from Anna, a lady who works for Holroyd Howe...

### *Pi Day*

Many of you, as parents, might want to encourage children's interests in Pi further. There are many activities that you could do with this aim in mind, but here are a few that do not require rocket science!

1. Gather a collection of bottles, cans and other objects that have circular cross sections or based. Use a tape measure to find out the circumference of such objects, and then divide the circumference by how far it measures across the base of the object. You may get a range of different answers here, although they will all approximate or come close to Pi...so that children can see that you do not just memorise digits of Pi, but find it occurring in real life!
2. Use a tape measure to see how far it is around your child's head. It is vital to do this activity in inches, however! Then divide by Pi – and hey presto! You will have your child's hat size...
3. Look into Ancient Egyptian history – even the ancient Egyptians tried to find out the size of Pi – although they did not have the wherewithal to calculate Pi to as many places as we have done, they still came up with some interesting values and approximations.
4. For trivia about Pi, presented in an interesting or child-friendly way, try accessing the following video from Mash Up Math on YouTube:

So even though you will be reading this article after Pi Day has come and gone, it will still provide you with some interesting or worthwhile activities!

### *Sustainability and Mathematics*

On Thursday morning, we were fortunate to have a talk on sustainability from Anna, a lady who works for Holroyd Howe. Year Six learnt much information on sustainability and how it can be encouraged. The realised

that it was not good to grow crops in the same place over and over again, and also about the different sustainable certificates for sustainability and what they stood for.

We were able to see some of the links that sustainability had with the Geography that we had learnt in class, and this made the talk that much more relevant to our everyday lives – the care for our environment and earth that we had been reminded about in our lessons on Catholic Social Teaching also featured in sustainability, much to the surprise of some of the community.

How is Mathematics linked to sustainability and what can we do to reinforce some of the messages?

1. Go around supermarkets and see how many different sustainability stickers you can see. Count them. See which ones are more frequently displayed. Encourage your children to find out more about the different stickers.
2. Find out why foods with FairTrade stickers often cost more, and by how much: in this way, your child is realising that justice and fairness of pay for people comes with a price... Calculating percentage increases incurred by buying FairTrade products will help children to realise the need, hopefully, for us to buy justly sourced products.
3. Listen in Assembly or look at the school noticeboards when the subject of food waste comes up. Make their own estimates of how much food is wasted on a weekly or monthly or yearly basis. What can children do about this?
4. What happens in supermarkets with food that goes beyond its sell by date? What proportion of food is affected by this? How should we act as a result?

These are just a few ideas that you could consider using with your children to reinforce what sustainability is all about.

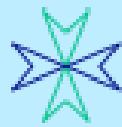
### Fundraising

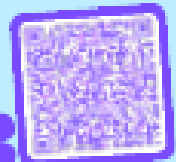

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## REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY

### NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

### MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

### Late collection of children

If a parent enrolls one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

### Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
