Dear Parents,

KS2 Collective Worship

Last week children in Year 5 led the Key Stage 2 Collective Worship. This was the first of our Lenten assembly series focussing on God's Perfect Promises, where we explored the symbol of the rainbow given to Noah as a sign of hope. Lent is a time to remember that Jesus is the fulfilment of all our hopes!

God spoke to Noah and his sons, "See, I establish my Covenant with you, and with your descendants after you."

Genesis 9:8-9

The Year 5 children explained that Lent is a period of six weeks where we prepare for Jesus' death on the cross on Good Friday (followed by Eastertide, which celebrates His Resurrection!) Lent is 40 days long (excluding Sundays). Lent begins on Ash Wednesday (last week) and ends on Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday. The last week of Lent is called 'Holy Week'.

Ash Wednesday is on 14th February 2024 (Lent begins)

Lent lasts 40 days

Palm Sunday is on 24th March 2024.

Lent ends on 28th March 2024 (Holy Thursday)

Good Friday is on 29th March 2024

Easter Sunday is on 31st March 2024

The key messages which Year 5 shared with the other children were:

- God's promises (covenant) show His unchanging love and commitment to us.
- God gives us hope through His promises and through sending His son Jesus.
- Jesus is the fulfilment of all our hopes and we can bring that hope to others as we GIVE, ACT and PRAY this Lent.

We sang 'Who put the colours in the rainbow'

It was a lovely Collective Worship and the children were encouraged to continue to think about How they can share God's hope with others this Lent when you GIVE, ACT and PRAY.


Catholic Social Teaching

Reception:

It's been out of this world exploring space with Reception these past couple of weeks! Last week, we learned about rockets and life in space. We learned that astronauts often eat dehydrated food out of a bag! We had a go at making our own astronaut food using powdered pudding mix, water, resealable bags, straws, and a funnel. This was a hit.

Children also had a go at making their own rockets using super-light clay. I was so impressed with their attention to detail when moulding the different components. They also enjoyed painting planets with puffy paint. We continued our investigations this week, with a closer lens on the different planets in our solar system. We started making our own papier Mache planets. This has been a good opportunity to reflect on the appearance and size of each planet. The Children have thought up of some interesting queries that we've been exploring as a class, like 'Why don't people live on Mars?'. Space has also made its way into our writing as we've been going on planet word hunts, 'Write the Room' around the classroom and retelling the story, 'Talk 4 Write', 'How to Catch a Star.' We're looking forward to continuing our space quest next week and seeing how we can dig even deeper!

Year 4 - Design and Technology:

Algebra - the Beginnings

For those of you with long memories, you may well recall something from algebra lessons when you were at school. And then there are all those topics that you studied, not all of which may have seemed relevant to you at the time...

How do you prepare children for starting algebra?

- The first thing you need to know about this is that you do not have to wait until the children are 'old enough' or at secondary school. In fact, training in algebra can begin at almost any age part of what is involved in algebra involves pattern recognition and pattern spotting.
- Look at a pattern of squares and circles, say, and help the children to identify the shapes then you can guess together at what shape comes next, and so on...
- Think of a number of problems can be fun at an elementary level 'Think of a number, add 3, and the answer is 8. What is my number?' Once a child is used to this type of question, you can allow your child to make up their own problems on you, the parents...And as many of you realise, this is one of the early foundations for solving equations!

• Even simple shopping problems can be seen as a start to algebra: 'One egg costs 60p, so how much do 3 eggs cost?' Here, you are laying (at least in part) the foundations for algebraic substitution.

These are just the foundations, and there are plenty of other ideas to try out en route.

Just keep the activities short and enjoyable so that your child has positive associations with these forays into algebra!

PS Should you be at all interested in discussing matters related to algebra and how to teach it further, do please email me to fix up a meeting. I would be happy to discuss this, or any other related mathematical activity.








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REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
