
TCS London Marathon – Sunday 21st April – Mr Hirst running

Mathematical Adventure Games and Simulations

I have long been an advocate of certain types of mathematical adventure game – at least, those games where one must solve mathematical problems in order to make progress within a game.

Way back in the 80s, there was a lady who created some of the earlier adventure games for primary schools. Her name was Anita Straker, and when I was teaching in Ladbroke Grove we used quite a few of her games. They were fun to play, and had the children solving not only plenty of mathematical puzzles but also working on some elementary mapping skills.

Should you wish to access any of these games on the computer/internet, you should follow the instructions:

- 1. Type in: Computer Games by Anita Straker
- 2. Select the option that says: BBC Micro Games Archive (with Anita Straker's name directly below)
- 3. Of the seven games that follow, not all of them are accessible. You can select (by clicking on the title of the game on the image) any of the following games: Merlin's Castle, The Lost Frog, Martello Tower. These three are all adventure games, with The Lost Frog suitable for younger children, Martello Tower and Merlin's Castle for older children. Mallory Manor is more a game of deduction, and Tea Shop is a simulation where you are running a tea shop. It's very useful for practising arithmetic skills as well as estimating and prediction skills.

The games are very much a product of their time, but can yield plenty of interesting problems. Should any of you try these games and experience problems, do please let me know and I can give you appropriate hints!

And should you wish for a more complex game that currently has Year Six involved, type in: L – a mathemagical adventure.

Although it is not created by Anita Straker it does involve a good range of problems that will draw children in. It is best accessed via the BBC Micro Games Archive.

United Kingdom Linguistics Olympiad 2024

Children from Years Five and Six participated in the annual Linguistics Olympiad back in early February. Results have now come through – and although there were fewer candidates overall who took part across the country, the boundaries for Bronze, Silver and Gold were far higher than usual.

However, we received five Bronze awards – which was a good result given the raising of the national boundaries.

Our Bronze awards went to Alice, Anna, Lara, Marta and Tilly-Rose, all of whom are in Year Six.

The highest scorers in Year Five were Apolline, Edda, Hugo, Isabella and Kyosuke.

Special mention should be made for Claudia and Gina in Year Six. They decided to see how far they could go on some of the more advanced problems in this year's contest and narrowly missed attaining Bronze awards at the Intermediate level of the Linguistics Olympiad, where the questions are broadly aimed at pupils in Key Stage Four. This is no mean feat for two pupils who were not yet 11 at the time of the competition!

We look forward to seeing how well Saint Christina's pupils will do in next year's Olympiad.

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REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
