

# Mathematics – It's as easy as 1, 2, 3...

Here is a simple challenge that can be tackled at a variety of different levels...

Give your child the numbers 1, 2 and 3 – and then ask what the biggest number is that can be made from these numbers. Many children will reply 123, but some will say '321'. Straightaway, you are dealing with place value.

The next step is to tell children that they may use whatever signs they want too... They will come up with sums such as 32+1, and others might think of calculating  $31 \times 2$ ... Other children might use brackets: e.g.  $3 + (2 \times 1)$  and see if this can affect their calculations.

And then we have indices: children may also suggest calculating 13<sup>2</sup>, or even 21<sup>3</sup>...

If nothing else, this challenge can have children not only practising their skills in arithmetic, but also using their imagination or creativity to come up with novel solutions and expressions.

And you do not have to be tied to using just the numbers 1, 2 and 3 – I have often used the numbers 2, 3 and 4 to very good effect and have been amazed at all the different results that Year Six have come up with!

# **KS2** Collective Worship – The Stations of the Cross (From Last Term)

To show our love to Jesus, we are going to follow Him on His final journey on the road to Calvary. Jesus is our friend. He died for us. Let us carry His cross with Him.

The Stations of the Cross is a Lenten devotion which helps us to reflect prayerfully on Jesus' final steps on the way to his crucifixion and death. It marks 14 different stages of Christ's Passion from the moment he was condemned to death, to receiving the Cross and then the events on the walk to his crucifixion. Every child took part in our final Collective Worship of the term and contributed to our overall reflection. We started the worship by singing 'Our God is a Good God' and we sat in one big circle.

Each year group took it in turns to pray the Stations of the Cross, moving our way around the circle. As we thought about each station, we imagined ourselves walking with Jesus on his journey. Reflecting on Jesus' journey lead us to pray for all kinds of suffering in the world, and in our own hearts.

It was fantastic to have every child involved in such a special Collective Worship.

# **Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's**


Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- **Human Dignity** 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'



- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- **The Common Good** What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- Solidarity Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- **Family, Community and Participation -** This means all people have the right to participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for all.



• **Dignity of Workers** - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principals throughout the academic year. The principal we will be focusing on this half term is Dignity of the Worker.

The Church has long been a supporter of the right of people to work. Work is more than simply being able to earn money. It is about being able to support oneself, and one's family. It is about finding a role and place within society, finding fulfilment and a sense of purpose and worth. It is also about people being paid a just wage and having adequate facilities to do the work they are tasked with, which is why the Church supports both the Living Wage and Fair-Trade movements.

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# **REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY**

#### **NUT FREE SCHOOL**

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

#### **MEDICATION IN SCHOOL**

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

#### Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

#### Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.

### **Sunday Mass**

Just a reminder to everyone, you are all invited to join Sunday Mass, which is held in the Chapel at 10.00am

#### Safety around drop-off

A polite reminder – if you are dropping your child off for breakfast club or a morning music lesson, **your child must be supervised until the doors open at 8am and under no circumstances left unattended**.
