## Nursery

This term in Nursery, has been exploring traditional tales. We have been learning how to retell classics like Goldilocks and the Three Bears as well as crafting characters for The Three Little Pigs. The children have been immersed in storytelling, and the introduction of Talk4Write has further enriched their vocabulary and storytelling abilities. Alongside these adventures, we've also delved into various aspects of Jesus' life, connecting his story to our own through pictures and stories, which we have also touched upon in our EYFS Liturgies. In Maths and Phonics, differentiated groups have started since January as the children work on their blending, handwriting, letter formation, and numeracy skills. Additionally, we've celebrated Heritage Week, in which we explored Ecuador and the Chinese New Year. During these topic weeks, we learnt about different cultures and participated in some unusual activities, such as weaving blankets for alpacas. Not to mention our two parent visitors who shared with the class information about their cultures and countries.

## KS1 this half term

## Year 1

In RE, our topic has been families and celebrations. We have enjoyed thinking about what Jesus was like as a boy and hearing the stories of The Presentation and Jesus in the Temple. We have been learning about Baptisms and enjoyed looking at photos of friends in our class being Baptised. We enjoyed exploring the chapel as we learnt about our Church family, spotting lots of different things such as candles, the Bible, stained glass, the Stations of the Cross and the tabernacle. In maths, we have been developing our addition and subtraction skills, halves, and learning about money. We have enjoyed setting up our own shop within the classroom.

In English, our topic story was 'The Proudest Blue'. We enjoyed making predictions, writing captions for the

story, and writing similes. We retold some traditional Irish tales, such as Oisín i dTír na nÓg, during international week. We also planned and wrote our own spring poems based on our senses. In science, we have continued to learn about everyday materials. We enjoyed testing if materials were waterproof or not and designed an umbrella to keep Teddy dry in the rain. In geography, we have enjoyed learning about Hot and Cold places. We also learned about Ireland during International Heritage Week. We baked soda bread, made flags, listened to Irish music, and tasted some Irish treats. We made wonderful presentations about our heritage and presented them to the class, teaching each other about the food, games, cultures, and languages of different countries.

## Year 2

In English this term, we have explored stories with a repeating pattern. This provided an opportunity for children to apply their understanding of capital letters, full stops, and the inclusion of vivid adjectives. The focus then shifted to information texts, differentiating between fiction and non-fiction, and grasping the distinct features that characterise information texts. Activities included organising facts into paragraphs, creating subheadings, deploying expanded noun phrases, and mastering the use of commas in lists.

Our mathematical focus has expanded to exploring fractions more comprehensively. This involved understanding equivalent fractions and mastering the skill of finding fractions of amounts. Children also developed their knowledge of addition and subtraction, solving intricate missing number problems.





Religious Education centred on the theme of the Good News. Children reflected on the poignant moment when Jesus was lost in the temple as a boy and contemplated the qualities required of disciples in contemporary times.

Continuing our scientific journey, we have delved into the captivating realm of seed dispersal this term. Children considered various mechanisms plants employ to spread their seeds, including designs that stick on animals and humans. Practical experiences extended to understanding the conditions necessary for healthy plant growth, culminating in a STEM lesson building pyramids and the hands-on activity of planting cress seeds.

In History, we have taken part in many engaging activities as children created timelines illustrating the pivotal events in Florence Nightingale's remarkable life.

In Geography, our exploration centred on the UK and its constituent countries. Utilising world maps, atlases, and globes, children identified key facts about each country, fostering a broader understanding of the geographical landscape.

Year 2 have enthusiastically embraced a spectrum of specialist subjects, including PE, Spanish, Art and Computing, finding joy in the diverse and engaging learning experiences each discipline offers.


# KS2 this half term

It's been an incredibly busy and fun filled half term. The children in KS2 have all been working extremely hard in all areas of the curriculum. We have, of course, enjoyed several Key Stage 2 events together, including the Diversity Day and the House Quiz. It is always so wonderful to see how our children work so well together in mixed age groups.

# Year 3

The children in Year 3 have been learning about Europe in their Geography lessons and were excited to zoom in on Italy during International week. The highlight of the week was designing and making their own pizzas. The projects that the children created about their heritage were wonderful, and they presented them brilliantly to the class.

The children have been learning about traditional tales in their English lessons and have also been doing some report writing on

## Year 4

The children in Year 4 have thoroughly enjoyed reading their class text, 'Journey to the River Sea', which has great links to their geography topic of South America. In Maths they have been learning about the expanded method and partition method of multiplication with a two-digit and one-digit number, obtuse, acute, and right angles, subtraction, and addition chains to support mental arithmetic.

They have also learnt about regular and irregular polygons in geometry. The topic in Geography has been South America. As part of International and Heritage Week they learnt about Bolivia.



It was fantastic that they chose this country because of the sister schools of the Sacred Heart of Jesus that are found there. They learnt about the countries of South America, lines of longitude and latitude, climate zones, weather patterns, and biomes.



In art they have been looking at famous artwork by South American artists. They created colour wheels and learnt about primary, secondary, and tertiary colours. They have also created mosaic-style pieces of art inspired by South American artist Romero Britto.

Year 4 thoroughly enjoyed their class trip, to the Living Rainforest in Berkshire. During the trip the children attended a workshop based on animal and plant adaptations. The children saw a variety of animals native to South America and plants. This links to their learning in Geography, English, and Science.

The children have been busy creating research projects throughout the term, which have included the following topics: Kings and Queens, Ancient Gods, Famous Books and Africa.



## Year 5

The children have continued to work incredibly hard this term in preparation for their 11+. Current Affairs sessions and Reasoning continue to take place weekly within the time table and the children are utilising the Atom Learning online platform. A new session for the children this half term has been Critical Thinking. They have really enjoyed taking part in a number of different tasks, which have made them think 'outside of the box'. At the end of every Maths lessons, the children are now self-assessing themselves for 'Confidence, Speed and accuracy'. They are working on increasing (or decreasing) the speed at which they work and gain greater accuracy throughout.

The class topic this term is 'Our Living Planet' with the main focus on water. The children are enjoying their Geography lessons all about water, how and why we use water, the water cycle, the water treatment process, comparing water usage in Kenya and the UK, and how water can be used for power to contribute to a more sustainable future are just some of the things we have looked at so far. The cross curricular approach to the topic has seen the children get really stuck into their class novel 'Kensuke's Kingdom' and in art, the children have recreated the Monet Water Lilies painting and have also made some lilies using clay.



Our focus in class during International Week was on Kazakhstan, which was fantastic. The amount of learning that took place about the country was remarkable. To make our International Week even more impressive, it has been wonderful to see the huge efforts from the children as they have researched their family trees, and some even



traced their ancestors back several centuries! The children were so engaged and thoroughly enjoyed sharing their family's history!





# Year 6

Year 6 has conducted themselves brilliantly throughout the term, as they have visited many different schools for their interviews. It has been a really positive few weeks for the children, and they look forward to hearing from the Secondary Schools soon with regards to their applications. In RE, the children have had a chance to not only revise what happens at Mass and in what order, but have been able to deepen their knowledge and understanding of what happens. They even carried out interviews with members of their families to see what they all thought.

In English, they have started their new set book, 'Macbeth', and have used drama to gain a fuller understanding of the play. In class, they have also focused on the development of language, and in particular, how English has developed throughout the ages. Looking at linguistics puzzles has helped them to understand further how different languages operate and has certainly helped them to prepare for this year's Linguistics Olympiad.

In Maths they have been furthering their knowledge of geometry, dividing their time between calculating angles and also constructing a variety of different polygons. A few children managed to construct dodecagons and mystic roses! There has also been an emphasis on problem solving with fractions and number sequences.

The children have been revising their map reading skills with all the knowledge that accompanies this in their Geography lessons and will be applying these to study rivers. History has consisted of looking further into what the Ancient Greeks were like and what their interests and priorities were.

The highlight of the term has been DT. Just before the end of last term, the children were introduced to the F1 project by Mr. Hirst, and this continued apace with much enthusiasm. They have constructed cars, pit stops, and portfolios, as well as other associated items, and then got the chance to race their cars against those from other schools at the RAF base at Benson. The children learnt a lot from the whole project. One of teams' cars ame in 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 14 cars in the primary race, as well as one of our teams winning first prize for the best-designed portfolio in the primary section of the competition.

## Music – A New Beginning!

It has been a privilege and a joy to begin 2024 at Saint Christina's, and I am very grateful to the staff, pupils, and the wider school community here for making me feel so welcome.

All the children have been learning some new hymns for Mass and assembly, and I have been delighted with their enthusiasm and readiness to learn new things, as well as teach me the songs they know well. Music in the classroom has also been flourishing, and here is a summary of some of what we have been up to.

#### **Nursery and Reception**

We have been exploring sounds and rhythm using our voices and bodies through songs and rhymes, actions, marching, and finding creative ways to keep the pulse. A number of puppet friends have helped us, as has a giant scrunchie in "The Stretchy Band Song" (which, funnily enough, also proved very popular with year 5!).

#### Years 1 and 2

In addition to the rhythm, and song work above, we have been learning some topic-related songs. Year 1 explored a range of instrumental sounds for the different creatures in the song "Down there under the sea", and Year 2 performed a fun song about Florence Nightingale complete with actions they helped to invent.

#### Year 3

I have been impressed by Year 3's beautiful singing voices and would encourage as many as possible to join the Choir after half term! We have been working on musical questions and answers, copying patterns by ear, and will be moving on to some improvising and composing using tuned percussion.

#### Year 4

With carnival season in Brazil at this time of year and their class topic on South America, it seemed like the perfect time for Year 4 to embark on a samba project. We looked at samba parades and bands and the range of percussion instruments involved, and we have begun learning a samba piece involving call and response and several layers of rhythms. It can naturally be a little noisy, but it is lots of fun.

#### Year 5

We have examined what makes a good performance and are now working on improving our performance skills in some new areas. Chair drumming is a fantastic way to develop coordination, rhythm, and timing, and skills gained can be transferred to a real drum kit. We've been playing along to some well-known songs and having fun getting it wrong—including me!

#### Year 6

Another class of beautiful singers, we have been examining a chord sequence known as "The Four Chord Trick" and finding out just how many songs make use of it. This will lead to some a cappella vocal work, but we will also be preparing songs for the Easter Play after half term.

Making music with others is one of the best ways to make progress and learn valuable musical skills. All the ensembles have spaces for new members, so please get in touch if you would like your child to take part.

## **REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY**

#### **NUT FREE SCHOOL**

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

#### **MEDICATION IN SCHOOL**

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have prescribed medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

#### Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

#### Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items.
